ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

SNHC India started organizing a 2 day National Conference on "Lesser known species of Madhya Pradesh" with the vision of Wildlife Conservation and sensitisation to youth as well as people in conservation, to plan and highlight conservation efforts and management challenges of Lesser Known species. Lesser known as in, species with very low distribution, less researched, rapid population decline, data deficient and Endangered.

To fill this conservation gap the first conference was organised in Jan 2023 followed by the 2nd in Jan 2024 with expected outcome being, to come up with better conservation action plans and management strategies for these species through utilization of available research data focusing on their current status, conservation challenges and way forward that is recommendations from the researchers and scientists for the concerned departments , wildlife institutes and NGO's to execute on the field and if data is deficient or unavailable in any of these species then it must be planned and detailed research is to be done to analyse the issues as without that nothing can be figured out.

In 2 days of both the conferences, about 15 technical sessions were held in which speakers shared their rich experience and hard work in the field and threw light on different aspects of Biology to Ecology, from conservation challenges to conservation strategies. People active in the field of nature conservation came together under one roof to plan and act for the conservation of these lesser-known species of Madhya Pradesh.

SNHC India is trying to fill the gap and strengthen the conservation community of Central India by highlighting very important and much needed topic of lesser-known species that are equally important as flagship species of Madhya Pradesh. We in Collaboration with **MP State Biodiversity Board** are coming up with the 3rd edition of the conference to push the conservation efforts & Management plans of lesser known Faunal species of MP.

For a broader and more scientific approach after conducting our 3rd Conference in Jan 2025 we will move to Landscape conservation resulting in the addition of few more states and a lot more diverse lesser-known species seeking attention there. The conference will then be titled as "National Conference on Lesser-Known Species of Central Indian Landscape" which will be a pivotal step in strengthening the conservation community of Central India.



ABOUT MPSBB Madhya Pradesh State Biodiversity Board has been constituted by the State Government as per the provisions of Biological Diversity Act, 2002 notified by the Government of India. Objectives of the Board being Conservation of biodiversity, Sustainable use of its components and Equitable sharing of benefits arising out of the use of biological resources and associated traditional knowledge.

Board has an advisory role in promoting biodiversity concerns among various stakeholders. One of the focus areas of the board includes promotion of research and advocacy of policy in gap areas. The lesser known faunal species is one such gap area which needs focus and action.



their shores stand silent sentinels that testify to the growth of the city.

Bhopal today presents a multi-faceted profile; the old city with its marketplaces and fine old mosques and palaces still bears the aristocratic imprint of its former rulers, among them the succession of powerful Begums who ruled Bhopal from 1819 to 1926. Equally impressive is the new city with its verdant, exquisitely laid out parks and gardens, broad avenues and streamlined modern edifices. It is greener and cleaner than most cities in the country.

Bhopal has enacted the concept of unity in diversity. Here, people of all religions and communities live by mutual goodwill and brotherhood.

The main centres of rural and urban culture in the city are Bharat Bhawan, Museum of Mankind, Swaraj Bhawan and Ravindra Cultural Bhawan. Van Vihar has also been developed for conservation of wild animals, in which there are rare wild animals of different species. Surrounded by lakes and hills, this district is famous for its natural shade.
